SOUTH AFRICA - Spring 2010

Background:

Sverre Meisingseth is a Norwegian police officer who loves handgun hunting. Sverre has hunted more than 100 African animals with handgun over the past 10 years, including a Cape Buffalo in Zim. We started corresponding after we made contact on a hunting and shooting forum (website) and have stayed in contact ever since. Hopefully at some point we will hunt together, but at this stage we get together for a chat and to catch up once a year, when Sverre passes through JHB International Airport on his way to the Eastern Cape.

This is a story that Sverre put together for HHASA.

Every spring - I travel to South Africa to hunt / test new bullets. I have visited SA ten times.

I have shot 123 animals in Eastern Cape with 357 Mag., .44 Mag., 454 Casull, 30/30 and 375 JDJ.

The last six times - my outfitter has been Johan Dreyer (www.safarishuntafrica.com) in Grahamstown.

Within the years – I have been so lucky that I could arrange hunts for the B8 (The "Big Five" and hippo, croc and giraffe) too – but on those hunts – my clients have hunted with rifles (shame on them!!!!).

But I have found space to shoot buffalo with a 454 – within one of the hunts in Zim.

Since I do not have a big house - and the walls are "fully booked" with trophies - I choose to shoot smaller (and affordable) animals.


It was the cast 255 gr. Keith - that should be "measured" this time.

I had the bullet in two different hardnesses:

One was "clean" wheel weights, while the other was "dumped" in water.

Ruger Super Redhawk in .44 Mag., was this year's revolver. My Doctersight and a Leupold 2x - were sighted-in with the above bullets. Leupold No. 2 - also a 2x - was also sighted-in - but with Mimek 300 gr.

I have hunted with the Mimek bullet several times - and it has been "++++". In this little 4 "` S&W - it has served me well. And I had to be sure I had a "safe alternative" - in case the 255 failed.







You may think:

What about the packageweight on the plane? Ammo is heavy stuff!

This thought is certainly important to consider - before your trip!

However, I've "built" myself a "small stock" of different ammo in different calibers - which is stored in SA.

And why do I choose a "daily" caliber as a .44?

I have hunted with a lot of different calibers – but do I need more power than the .44 for plains game?

If I should loose/forget my ammo – I can easily buy .44 ammo. Not so easy to buy 375 JDJ in SA (or other countries).

255 `s were without GC - and out of my SRH – the load gave me 1220 fps on a cold spring day (+2° C) in Norway.

The accuracy is very good!



The first shot was about 40 m, and the second shot at 80m.

How did those bullets perform?

During the first 6 days - I shot 4 blesbok and one impala, and 9 pigs.

Three of those - were shot with water-hardened bullets.

The rest – with clean wheel-weights.







I could not see any difference - as they penetrated right through.

The distances were from 30 to 90 m.

I found one bullet - and it was in a blesbok which was shot at 88 m.

This bullet was water hardened. The blesbok was walking toward me, and stopped at 88 m.





The bullet went in front of his shoulder - and was found in the skin on the other side (in the middle of the stomach).



Can it be better?

What about meat destruction?

This was shot at about 60 m.







Nothing indicates that this pig was shot with an explosive 300 Win Mag. !!!

As I mentioned, I had hunted with optics for the last 10 years, but this year I would hunt with open sights.

Age and longsightedness – has not let me hunt with the steel sights.

Therefor, I've installed fiber optic frontsight on it - and it "lights up like a meteor".


When you are at the shootingrange – you have to focus on the front sight. But you can't do that in a hunting situation. You also have to "control" your target. The fibersight – was "excellent" for my eyes. I did not have to spend energy looking for the sight. It "was just there".

As I mentioned above - I shot 14 animals the first 6 days. But then it was time-out! On each trip - I used to shoot a "barbiquepig". And why should it be different this year????

Open sights and .44 Ruger SRH – got him down at 44 m.



It ran 40 m after the shot.



And we barbequed!

But then there was the thorn - and it is in a double sense... I went into a cactus when I was carrying it to the nearest pick up location. I drew my foot back reflexively - and was completely paralyzed. One of the thorns had penetrated into my knee. Another bad thing – at the same time – was that I was bit by pepperticks! And I'm sure that I don't have to explain you Africans about that!!!


The hunt was therefore cut short from 10 to 6 days, but the last day I just had to get out, and got another couple of pigs with open sights.


The distances were approx. 30 m on both of these.
